

STEELHEAD FESTIVAL Saturday February 9th,10:00 - 4:00 Milt Brandt Visitor Center at Lake Sonoma



The 6th annual Steelhead Festival celebrates the annual return of steelhead to the Russian River and is sponsored by the Friends of Lake Sonoma. Past festivals have split a venue with

Healdsburg and this change allows visitors to follow the steelhead from Dry Creek through the fish ladder and into the hatchery, where the fish are sorted into holding tank.

This free event features activities at the Visitor Center, the lawns and the Fish Hatchery. Visitors will enjoy over 30 educational exhibits, a trout pond for young anglers, a fly fishing demonstration pond with tips from the pros, live steelhead display, art for kids to do, and a chance to try your hand at archery.

Trout Unlimited, Russian Riverkeeper, California Department of Fish and Wildlife, Army Corps of Engineers, Sonoma County Water Agency, Stewards of the Coast and Redwoods Gold Ridge RCD, Bird Rescue, Sonoma County Mycological Society, the Free Bookmobile and many more will have displays and information booths

Enjoy live music from Rosetown Ramblers and available for purchase: local brews from Bear Republic Brewery and Lagunitas Brewing Co. and fine wines from Truett-Hurst. Food trucks will be there: Chicago Style Hot Dogs, Paella and Ultimate Souvlaki.

NOAA UNDER SECRETARY VISITS FISH HATCHERY, HABITAT RESTORATION. By J.D. Hardesty

Dr. Jane Lubchenco, under Secretary of Commerce for Oceans and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration visited Lake Sonoma and the Don Clausen Fish Hatchery at the invitation of the NOAA-Western Region Dec. 5, where she received presentations on the Coho and Steelhead Broodstock Program and the Dry Creek Fish Habitat Restoration project.

With the broodstock program, managed and operated in partnership by the Corps of Engineers and the California Department of Fish and Game, helping to mitigate lost spawning habitat, and the Corps and Sonoma County Water Agency partnering to build a 6-mile fish habitat restoration project, record numbers of Coho and Steelhead are returning this year.

This program continues to attract national attention for it's collaboration and partnership among all stakeholders to address the 2008 Nation Marine Fisheries Service jeopardy biological opinion in the operation of our lake projects.

Perhaps you've noticed the yellow metal baskets popping up in the lawn and wondered what's happening? The United Flyers of Sonoma (UFOS) have partnered with Ranger Emmons to construct an 18 hole Disc Golf course using fields on both sides of the USACE headquarters building. This course is open sunrise to sunset and is still a "Work in Progress" Course maps are available at the visitor center.

Schroeder, James Proctor, John Child, Roger Cansler, Thaddeus Reichert and Adrian Cormier have volunteered over 157 hours building the course. The club also purchased ten baskets for a total donation of \$3,650. Club members are constructing the cement tees for each hole and use 41 bags of concrete per tee.

The UFOS were founded in 1976 on the Sonoma State University campus and is now an official Professional Disc Golf Association Affiliated Club.

A FISHY TALE The early and persistent rains help arriving fish by removing stream barriers. 281 Chinook salmon arrived between October 22 and December 17th. The last straggler swam in on January 14th. During the week of December 10, Chinook, Coho and steelhead were spotted in the fish stream. All Chinook are returned to the Russian River to spawn naturally.

While only 3 Coho returned this year, steelhead are arriving in record numbers: 1,347 fish by January 17th. In comparison, only 2203 steelies returned to the hatchery last year. Come view steelhead spawning every Thursday at 10:30 a.m. through mid-April. The hatchery is open, and it is a free event.

WINTER RAINS bring more than fish to the park. The dam face greens up and mushrooms start popping up under every tree. The wild 'shrooms pictured above were located under Oaks near the visitor center; they like shady, moist and humid environs. Remember, mushrooms can be poisonous and hazardous to your health. The Sonoma County Mycological Association will have an exhibit at the Steelhead Festival, February 9th, and will answer your questions about identity and safety.
