Students and agencies partner to release Coho salmon

SANTA ROSA, Calif. – On Thursday, May 10, Westminster Woods will release 2,000 Coho salmon smolts into Dutch Bill Creek as part of the ongoing Russian River Coho salmon recovery program. Students attending the Environmental Education Program will help put the fish in the creek alongside officials from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and Sonoma County Water Agency.

In an effort to restore the Coho salmon population in Dutch Bill Creek, a smolt imprinting tank was installed at Westminster Woods for the second year in a row and will provide home to a total of 6,000 fish (3 groups of 2,000 fish) this spring. The tank allows salmon in the smolt life stage to "imprint" on the unique characteristics of the Dutch Bill Creek water which will make it possible for them to return to the same creek in two years to spawn as adults. The smolts spend three weeks in the tank before they are released into the creek to make their way to the ocean.

In the last few decades, the number of Coho salmon in the Russian River watershed has drastically declined. Work in Dutch Bill Creek, which has historically supported wild runs of Coho is being done by many local organizations including Westminster Woods, Sonoma County Water Agency, California Department of Fish & Game, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, NOAA Fisheries and UC Cooperative Extension. Schools participating in the release are St. Rose School of Santa Rosa, The Reach Program of Sebastopol, Bannon Creek of Sacramento.
