#### HISTORIC SIGNING

Friday, August 3rd, marked a historic event at Lake Sonoma. Leaders from two nations met at the Milt Brand Visitor center to ratify a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) of cooperation following seven years of coordination.

This MOU covers a lease of twenty four acres which will be used for cultural purposes by the Dry Creek band of Pomo Indians. US Army Corps Lt. Colonel John Baker and Chairman Harvey Hopkins signed the agreement. Witnesses to this ceremony included; Chief of Operations, Michael Dillabough; Tribal Elder, Reggie Elgin; Tribal Administrator, Gus Pina; and tribal dancers, Homer Cordova, Max Cordova, Joe Gonzales and Andy Gonzales.

A celebratory BBQ for all participants completed the day's activities.



#### **RESTORING SALMON HABITAT**

Ground-breaking just below the Warm Springs Dam on Dry Creek starts the next step on an ambitious project to improve habitat and provide refuge for the native Coho Salmon and Steelhead Trout.

October 17th marked the first shovel of the \$1.8 million project restoring 1600 feet of Dry Creek to pre-dam conditions; slow moving, shaded waters. "This project will pilot the enhancement of six miles of Dry Creek", stated US Army Corps Lt. Colonel John Baker These in-stream improvements will aid the fish without reducing the flow of Dry Creek

### HAVING A BIRTHDAY? CELEBRATE AT WARM SPRINGS RECREATION AREA -

The recreation area is a popular place with local families wanting to celebrate special events. Check out some of the bounce houses that made an appearance this summer. Warm Springs Recreation Area group picnic shelters are available for only \$50! Do you want to have more people than one site can hold? Do you want to have amplified music? Do you want other special accommodations? If so, you can apply for a Special Use Permit. The application fee is \$50 and the forms are available at Park Headquarters. **CALLING ALL PIGGIES** - During the cooler winter months when visitation is low and the trails are empty, the Corps opens the Lake Sonoma hills to Archery only, wild boar hunts. Pigs do an incredible amount of damage, rooting for acorns and grubs. This rooting increases the erosion rate on the surrounding hills, in turn increasing the silting of the lake.



*New this year*—-Hunters can pursue these hogs seven days a week.

Hunter registration begins Thursday, November 1st with Saturday, November 24 as the first hunt day. While hunt regulations remain the same, there is one change for registration. Registration will be at the visitor center, <u>Wednesday through Sun-</u><u>day, only</u>! Hunters need to present a drivers license, hunting license and a pig tag and pay \$30 to complete the process.

**BEST KEPT SECRET IN THE PARK** - The Milt Brandt Visitor Center reopened to the public on July 1st. While the infrastructure is complete, visitors will notice the lack of displays. These are definitely a "Work in Progress".
