2011 will be an exciting year for Lake Sonoma. We will begin or complete several important construction projects including the rehab of the Visitor Center and Water Purification Plant at Liberty Glen Campground.

The winter season is not only the rainy time but some of our busiest, with all of the fish returning to spawn and the many school children that come to see them. 75% of our school field trips are reserved; if you or your child's school would like to arrange a tour, call us soon at 707-431-4533. Be sure to visit the improved streambed habitat down by the fish ladder and see our fish spawn naturally! Steelhead sorting is daily at 10:30; spawning occurs Thursdays for 16 weeks at 10:30 starting January 6th. The highlight of the Season is our Annual Steelhead Festival on February 13th from 10-3 with food, wine, music, tours, kids activities and more! Don't miss it and have a great 2011!

SWIMMINGLY SUPER NEWS -CHINOOK NUMBERS UP

Heavy autumn rains have given us a gift of fish. The Chinook returners have reached record numbers in the Russian River and here at the hatchery. The first Chinook arrived October 27th. More than 40 arrived and were returned to the Russian to spawn naturally.

COHO IN DRY CREEK

10,000 Coho smolts (one year old) were planted in Dry Creek in 2008 with the first returner arriving December 6th. While most Coho swim into the hatchery, a pair spawned in the improved streambed. Ben White, Coho Recovery Program supervisory biologist and staff released more than 160.000 offspring from the 2009-2010 spawning season, continuing efforts to restore a self-sustaining wild population.

First Steely arrived December 4, (one of the earliest ever). Personnel have hopes this will be a banner year. 1st spawn, 1/6/2011.


